WOODY JACKSON: ARTIST IN RESIDENCE

Artist Woody Jackson spent two days in residence at Maple Street School, painting watercolor landscapes with students. Artists in kindergarten though eighth grade spent time trying to capture the Vermont landscape while learning the fine craft of watercolor painting under Mr. Jackson's gentle guidance.

Mr. Jackson inspired all of the student artists that he worked with. One kindergartener noted, "My cows are not as good as Mr. Jackson's but he told me they were awesome, and that made me feel good." Another student stated, "Mr. Jackson was so nice. He told me it was okay to paint my mountains red. I even painted a cow purple."

Mr. Jackson is probably best known for his partnership with Ben and Jerry's. In 1983, Ben Cohen left Woody a message that would lead to a licensing agreement between the two, allowing Mr. Jackson to become a full-time artist. His cows have become the look of Ben and Jerry's, gracing ice cream containers, the walls of their ice cream shops, billboards and trucks. In his free time, Mr. Jackson coaches his children's soccer teams and visits one or two schools annually as an artist in residence.

Many thanks to Maple Street School art teacher, Leslie Sullivan, to Andrea and Larry Ross for hosting Mr. Jackson at their home, to John Rindell of our local Ben and Jerry's for supplying ice cream for the entire school, and to the parents and faculty of Maple Street School for making this opportunity happen.


The historic play, Julius Caesar, was adapted to 1978 Bensonhurst, Brooklyn, with Caesar as a disco dance champion, and included such songs as "Stayin' Alive," "How Deep is Your Love," and "Jive Talkin'." This was the fourth consecutive year that Mary Mangiacotti and Erin Gill Reilly teamed up to create an adaptation for an all-school production, with music becoming an important part of the script for a unique interpretation. "Erin's ability to choose songs and weave them into the story is a real gift," Mary explained. "She creates a magic moment on stage for each of the classes so that all students are involved in a meaningful and entertaining way." Erin added, "Mary's childhood in Brooklyn was a fantastic catalyst to teach the story using an especially funky time in popular music, and encourage all the characters to speak in distinct New York accents!" This was a highly collaborative project with teachers, Maureen Chaffee as stage manager, Geoff Chamberlain on lights, and Zak Hampton as sound engineer, and the entire faculty and staff, whose talents made this an exceptionally delightful evening.

LILY THEBAULT RECIPIENT OF THE JAY HATHAWAY COURAGE TO CARE AWARD

We are proud to award the Jay Hathaway Courage to Care Award to Lily Thebault. When Maple Street began in 1998, the founders decided that we would not have a valedictorian or a dean's list, we would not have awards based on athletics or academics or the arts. Instead, they wanted to highlight the one thing that was perhaps most important; serving our community.



Since then, Maple Street has had a service award in place because it is through service and caring for others that we make a difference. Four years ago, we renamed the award the "Jay Hathaway Courage to Care" award. We chose this name because *Courage to Care* is an Academy Award nominated documentary and book celebrating those who risked their lives to save Jews during the Holocaust. It was the simple, everyday people, not heroically looking for accolades, but just truly compassionate people, through simple acts of kindness, who helped others and even saved lives. It is that natural love for others and exuberant love of life, very much like the happy way that Jay Hathaway lived everyday, that inspires this award.

Lily's naturally warm and positive spirit, as well as her outstanding dedication to community service earned her the 2014 Jay Hathaway Courage to Care Award. Lily has embraced all that Maple Street School has to offer. She is a natural leader, serving as president of student council. She also volunteered for many jobs at Maple Street including hosting the talent show, supporting KURA, taking care of younger student on the playground, and going above and beyond in her work-job. In addition, Lily has traveled extensively on unique service trips that have broadened her understanding of the world and its people.
